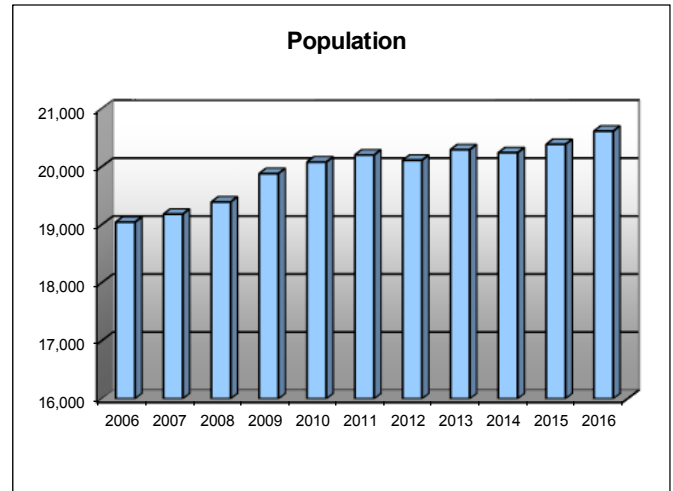

Workforce Trends

Population

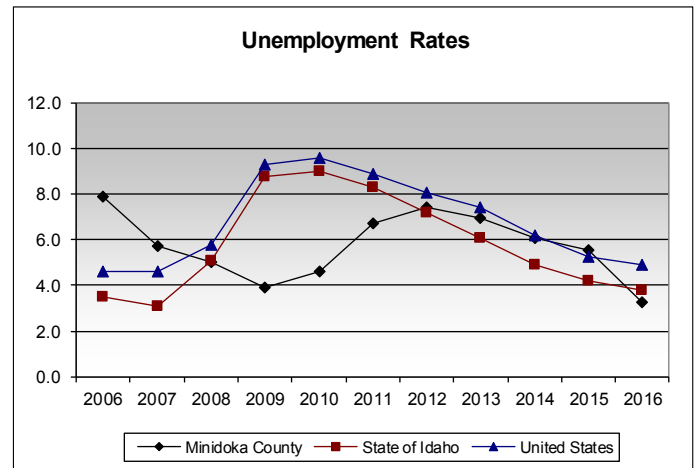
The population of Minidoka County is growing after a series of starts and stops. Incremental increases in eight of the last 10 years produced a 8.2 percent increase over the decade to 20,616 in 2016. Rupert, the county seat, has an estimated population of 5,705 for 2015. The downtown core has retained its historic buildings including the iconic Wilson Theatre, renovated with community collaboration. The downtown plaza is one of the few remaining in Idaho, continuing to be the centerpiece of the community.

Still heavily dependent on agriculture and food processing, the county economy has diversified to include durable manufacturing and wholesale and retail trade tied to agriculture. Wages tend toward the low end – a challenge in attracting and retaining workers but appealing to new businesses. New employers have been willing to pay higher wages although they remain below competing states. Renewed economic vitality, the area's scenic beauty and the lure of nearby recreation are drawing new residents and companies.



Labor Force & Employment

Minidoka County is commonly joined to Cassia County and referred to as the Mini-Cassia area. Employment in Minidoka County has traditionally been seasonal. The city of Burley lies in both counties, divided by the Snake River, and both counties are linked economically, politically and socially. The area offers a labor pool with a strong work ethic and a strategic location with convenient access to commercial rail and Interstate 84 with I-86 nearby. The unemployment rate peaked at 10.2 percent in 1986 and saw a record low of 3.3 percent in 2016. In the past, many workers relied on fresh pack potato operations, farm jobs, sugar processing and potato processing for employment. In 2003, the J.R. Simplot Co. closed its Heyburn plant, idling 600 workers, driving unemployment to 7.7 percent. After closure, the plant along the Snake River was donated to the city of Burley for an industrial park, which now houses a retail outlet, a restaurant associated with the

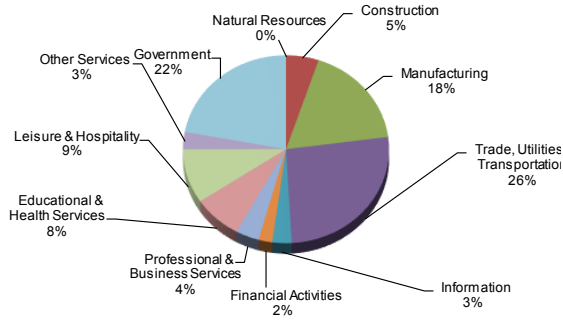


cheese plant and Gem State Processing, a potato dehydrator based out of Pasco, Washington. A previous tenant, Renova Ethanol, lost its half-built plant in bankruptcy proceedings with assets purchased by Natural Chem Holdings. Double L Manufacturing constructed a new plant for its custom-designed potato harvesting equipment marketed globally. PerforMix and WillTran have committed to facilities in Minidoka County, both with previous ties to southwestern Idaho.

Wages & Income

Minidoka County ranks 7th regionally and 13th among Idaho's 44 counties in per capita income. Growth has been robust at 52 percent since 2005 with a significant 14 percent record increase between 2010 and 2011. The per capita income grew a robust 4.8 percent from 2014, driven by Non-farm Proprietor's Income and outpacing the state and nation's growth of 3.3 and 3.7 percent, respectively. Growth was driven previously by a strong agricultural base and increased construction activity near the Heyburn-Burley Industrial Park and throughout the Mini-Cassia area. Farm proprietors' income experienced its greatest growth spurt in 2011 when it was \$81,765, up from \$31,695—a growth rate of 160 percent.

Average covered employment rose 6.7 percent from 2014, following a flat year previously, with wages growing 3.6 percent over the same time period. Employment in Professional and Business Services along with Educational and Health Care Services reported the largest growth at 22 percent and 29 percent, respectively. Manufacturing along with Trade, Utilities and Transportation had the largest numeric increases, adding 100 workers each. Wages for Other Services grew by almost 11 percent from 2014.
