

## Workforce Trends

### Population

After devastating mine and smelter closures, Shoshone County's population fell 28 percent in the 1980s and continued declining at a lesser rate in the following decades. Increasingly some Silver Valley towns became bedroom communities for the Coeur d'Alene area. From 2005 to 2015, the population fell 3 percent from 12,912 to 12,420 while Idaho's population grew 15.9 percent and the U.S. population grew 8.8 percent.


The county seat, Wallace, has a population of 761 in 2015. The largest cities are Kellogg with a population of 2,069, Pinehurst at 1,580 and Osburn at 1,510.



### Labor Force & Employment

High silver prices are breathing some life back into the mining industry, which had declined from a peak of 4,200 jobs in 1981 to just 310 in 2003. The Lucky Friday and Galena mines, which were the only ones left open, employ twice as many people as they did four years ago, and the Sunshine Mine reopened in 2007 after closing in 2001. By mid-2008, mining employed 700. Then the global recession hit, slashing prices for silver, lead and zinc. Sunshine shut down again and the Galena laid off workers in late 2008. In the last half of 2009, higher prices for silver and other minerals raised hopes, and by the end of 2010 exploration efforts increased and the Coeur side of the Galena Mine reopened in early 2011. Mining employment was back to 782 in 2015. The three richest silver mines in the United States are in Shoshone County.

Shoshone County is developing its tourism sector. In 1990, the world's longest gondola opened, running from Kellogg to the Silver Mountain ski area. In 2008, Silver




Mountain Resort broke ground on an 18-hole golf course and opened an indoor water park. Just two years later Silver Rapids was named one of the top 10 water parks in the nation. Wallace's charming and historic downtown draws many travelers off Interstate 90. Lookout Pass, a ski area along the interstate near the Montana border, doubled employment in the last few years. Hikers, bicyclists and snowmobilers are increasingly exploring the county's hundreds of miles of trails. The ski areas, tourist facilities, lodging, restaurants and bars employ about 400.

## Economic Development

In the early 1980s, Shoshone County was one of Idaho's three most prosperous counties. More than 20 years of high unemployment made it the third poorest by 2003. Fortunately, rising employment and wages over the last few years have helped the county regain some of its former luster. According to U.S. Census Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates, the county's median household income grew 31 percent between 2003 and 2008. But median household income fell nearly 9 percent from 2008 to 2009. As silver prices and production gained traction in 2010, median household income rose nearly 3 percent in 2010. The Silver Valley Economic Development Corp. is adamant about expanding and diversifying the economy.
