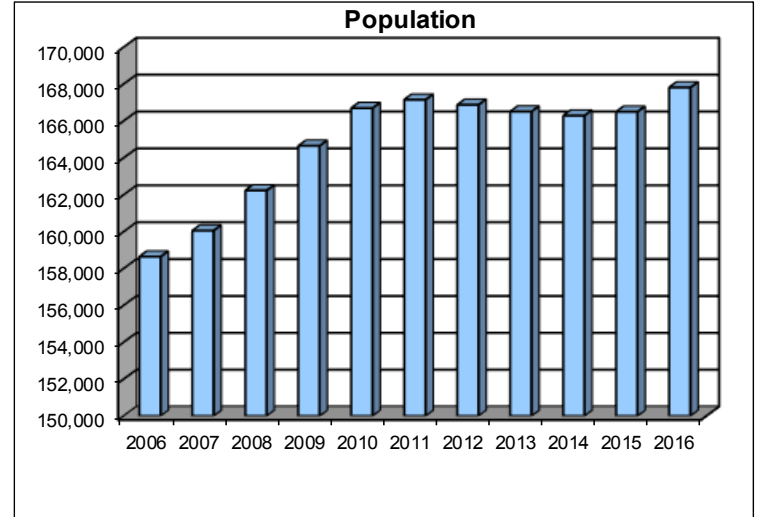

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## Workforce Trends

### Population

Southeast Idaho has experienced dynamic change over the past decade. The seven-county southeastern region of Idaho posted 5.8 percent population growth from 2006 to 2016 to 167,813. Between the 2006 and 2016, the region's largest county, Bannock, grew 7.5 percent to 84,377. The second largest county, Bingham, was up 4.2 percent to 45,201. Franklin County saw the largest growth over the decade—up 10.9 percent to 13,406. Only one county in the region had declining populations. Bear Lake fell 2.1 percent to 5,945.

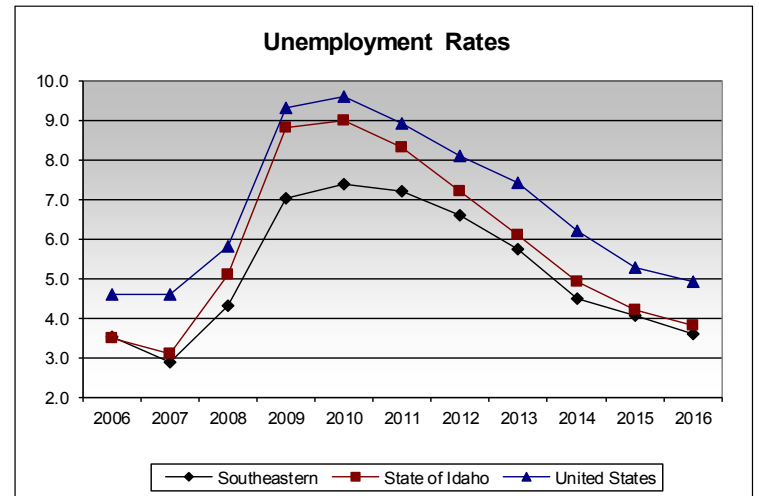


### Labor Force & Employment

Overall, annual unemployment rates have steadily declined since the 2010 peak of 7.4 percent. The annual average unemployment rate for 2016 was 3.6 percent which is a 0.5 percentage point drop from the previous year but still not quite as low as the 2007 pre-recession rate of 2.9 percent.

The region continued to have unemployment rates lower than both the state and the nation. Lower than average unemployment rates result from an increasingly stable and diverse economy.

Franklin County, which is part of the interstate Logan Metropolitan Statistical Area, consistently has one of the lowest jobless rates in the region because of commuters to Utah.



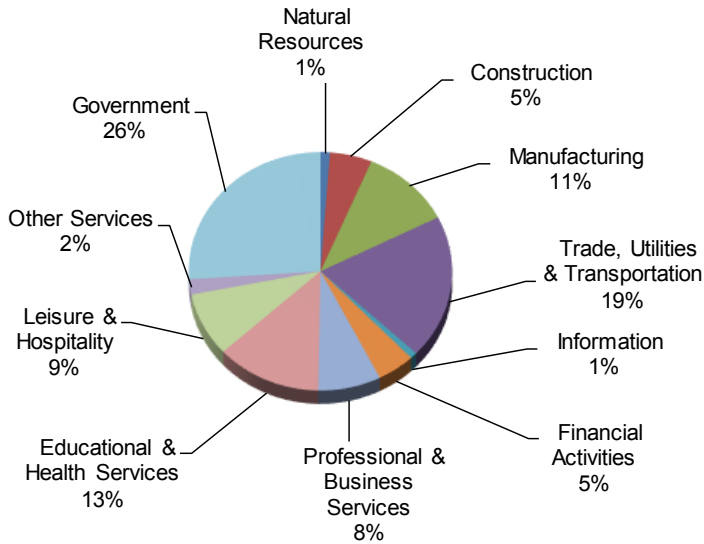

Southeastern Idaho has experienced changes over time with the closures of FMC elemental phosphorus plant, Heinz Frozen Foods, Ballard/Kimberly Clark medical supplies plant, and the merger of AMI and On Semiconductor with subsequent layoffs.

The region is slowly recovering with firms like Amy's Kitchen, Allstate Insurance, Golden Valley Natural and the expanding FBI data center providing many new employment opportunities.

## Industry Employment & Wages

The average wage grew 24 percent from \$28,094 in 2006 to \$34,958 in 2016. Wages in southeastern Idaho are among the lowest in the state and have factored into the region's low operating expenses that attract new employers. Manufacturing, financial services and mining jobs are among the highest paying. Leisure, hospitality and retail jobs are among the lowest paying. The large university student population in Pocatello also contributes to lower average wages because students are more likely to work part time. As more medical and research workers move to the area, it is likely wages will rise at a faster rate.
